#### Claims

"This threshold question that the court has to decide is whether or not what former President Trump did on January 6th, and then the lead up to January 6th, was part of his official duties, recognizing that the Supreme Court has said that courts should construe those duties broadly," says Roth. She also spoke to <u>Bloomberg</u> <u>Law</u> about the Maxwell trial.

"This is a very conservative, newly constituted court that is pretty skeptical of federal power writ large, so I think there's a good chance that one or both of these policies may be struck down," says Shaw.
