
Professor Ekow Yankah Is a Guest on WBEZ's Reset to Dicusss Jason Van Dyke's Release from Prison

"The reality that everybody recognizes is that most people who commit second-degree murder get vastly larger sentences than police officers-the average homicide gets almost 50 years in jail, whereas an average police killing gets around 16 years, but even compared to the average police killing [Van Dyke] got quite a lenient sentence," Yankah says.
