<u>Professor Alex Reinert Quoted in United Press International About Solitary</u> Confinement

<u>Professor Alex Reinert</u> was quoted in an article in *United Press International* regarding the case of a Pennsylvania inmate placed in solitary confinement after refusing to cut his dreadlocks. "Even when it's imposed for a short period, solitary confinement has a detrimental effect on a person's psychological and physical health, and as the time in isolation gets longer, the risk of harm increases," Reinert said.

<u>Professor Deborah Pearlstein Writes in Just Security for Congress to be Able to Act Remotely</u>

<u>Professor Deborah Pearlstein</u> wrote in *Just Security* about the idea of Congress working remotely: "Social distancing is essential to protect the health of lawmakers, their families, and their constituencies – and by extension the entire U.S. population...Congress is indispensable in setting a national example at a time when federal leadership has never been more important, or, tragically, less in evidence."
