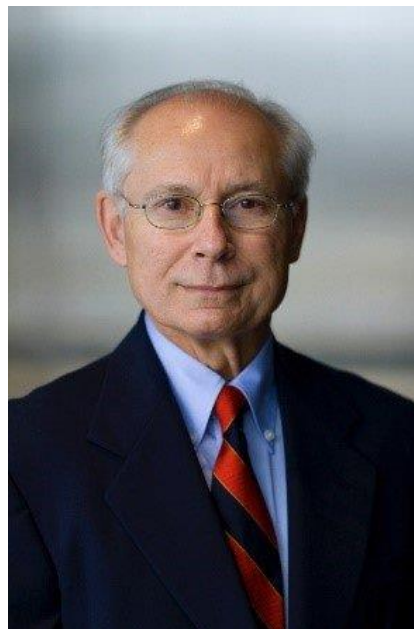

Joseph Levin, J.D., will discuss his own personal history growing up Jewish in Montgomery, Alabama, in the era of Jim Crow and those events that drove him to co-found the Southern Poverty Law Center in 1971.

Levin, a native of Montgomery, Alabama, is co-founder of the Southern Poverty Law Center. From 1971, he served the SPLC in various capacities, including legal director, chair of the board, president and CEO, and general counsel, retiring in 2016. He continues to serve the SPLC as an emeritus member of the board.

Levin's extensive litigation experience includes numerous jury and nonjury cases in state and federal courts and proceedings before federal administrative panels. His better-known cases include the landmark sex discrimination case of *Frontiero v. Richardson* and the private segregated school case of *Gilmore v. City of Montgomery*.

From 1979 until 1996, he practiced law in

Washington, D.C. A 1966 graduate of the University of Alabama Law School, he served in the U.S. Army, Military Intelligence branch, from 1967 to 1969.
