"How best to balance interests of open expression, public safety, and sustainable democracy on private social media platforms is a question of enormous complexity," writes Pearlstein.


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CLIHHR Releases New Module on Reparations in Law Teaching Guides Series

"What qualified immunity does is it protects officers who violate the constitution," says Reinert. "If an officer violates my constitutional rights, I will not have a remedy against that officer unless there was prior case law that made it clear that it was a violation of my constitutional rights."
