“In its last decision of the term, the Supreme Court invalidated the Biden Administration’s student debt relief plan, which was announced in August 2022 following COVID-19-driven loan repayment pauses by both the Trump and Biden Administrations,” Shaw wrote. “The plan would have eliminated debt of up to \$10,000—or \$20,000 for Pell grant recipients—for approximately 43 million borrowers.”
