A lawyer and an economist, Hadfield argues that globalization and the impact of information technology on the modern corporation will force the US legal system to radically change. She warns that the traditional legal infrastructure will have to adjust to a new economy that is more globalized -- both in terms of the rules binding actors and the flow of capital. *Rules for a Flat World* calls for opening up the market in lawyers by eliminating the gate-keeping function of the Bar and opening up the "market in rules" by allowing private parties to contract into the rule regime they prefer.
